Sic transit homo in mare (!)

We connect to the world through the Erie Canal. What a boating resource! If you've run *Ol' Algaebottom II* off mighty Seneca Lake, you've probably done the job *via* the C-S Canal to the Erie, turned eastward to Three Rivers and thence to Ontario (known to the Iroquois as "Place with Very Large Bumps").

Some folks, though, eschew the turn onto the Oswego Canal and continue east through Oneida Lake (hopefully avoiding that part of the voyage during any summer weekend, wall-to-wall boats being a real hazard to nav). These stalwart cruisers would the traverse the Mohawk River, running (*ed. note: you are hardly "running" at 5 mph!*) downstream past Utica, former home of Schultz and Dooley, the lock at Little Falls ("Hey! Look at the flies hanging on those cliffs... wait a minute! Those are climbers!) the sad old industrial town of Amsterdam, and finally to Albany. Here there are two choices, left or right (*ed. note: Hmmm!*).

- 1) Go south through the Federal lock at Troy, and continue on to the British Isles.
- 2) Take a left and find the scenic Champlain Canal. The towering Adirondack High Peaks stand on the left. History all around, this is an ideal time to reread Kenneth Roberts. With guidebook and chart in hand, a boater could identify the very cave celebrated in the ending of *Last of the Mohicans*. (Our vicarious boater would have plenty of time for these activities because a couple of the lockmasters on this canal are notable for timing vessels between locks.)

The canal enters the "tail" of Lake Champlain at Whitehall: restaurants ... nightlife ... marine services ... nightlife ... nightlife.

On the Lake itself are many marinas with lodging and food. Fort Ticonderoga is accessible by boat. A real gem for food and entertainment is Burlington VT, where the City Fathers have constructed a wonderful waterfront; the mariner would be advised to arrive there during daylight since the city and marina lights could be very confusing.

One wonders why Lake Champlain doesn't drain away, with the Champlain Canal to the Hudson dripping out of the south end, and the Richelieu River/Canal leading out to the St. Lawrence on the other. Traversing the latter is highly recommended, as is running the St. Lawrence River back to the U.S. and Ontario, and Oswego, and Watkins Glen.
