From the Commander

Ah, "spring commissioning", that special time of the year is upon us finally, and soon we will be in full swing getting our gear and our boats ready for launch. It's a great time to give our boats a close inspection from stem to stern and top to bottom, checking for anything that looks suspicious, possible water intrusion, weak spots, rotted lines, hardened hoses, places where water may have reached, frozen and expanded and broken things apart. When it thaws things can return to near normal positions and look fine.

I experienced a 1½" bronze gate valve in a water inlet line that had apparently suffered from being frozen. A quick visual inspection didn't reveal the crack. It was only after launch, when I opened it to test it, while in the water, it

allowed a high-pressure spray to hit me in the face and surprise the daylights out of me. Had I been more diligent I would have discovered it. We also need to check the dates on the inflatable vests and safety flares and other emergency equipment like fire extinguishers; restock and update our first aid kits; check the PFD's for signs of deterioration and replace as needed; and make sure all is ready for the water. A great way to make sure all is ready is to have a non-threatening, nonlegally binding Vessel Safety Check given by a friendly fellow boater who has studied to become a qualified examiner. It only takes about 30 minutes of your time but is worth its weight in gold for the peace of mind you get when you know your boat meets basic safety qualifications. While at the District 6 Spring Conference in Binghamton this April, I was made aware of a new initiative by NYS DEC to stop aquatic hitchhikers from

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being transported from one body of water to another, and it is called "CLEAN IT, DRAIN IT, DRY IT". We need to be keenly aware of the very real problem of invasive species of water plants and that we boaters can inadvertently transport them from one lake or river to another. There is a need to educate all boaters about this very real danger, so our DEC is asking that you do three things whenever you leave a waterway: 1) Check for and remove any visible plants or debris. 2) Clean and drain your boat and equipment. 3) Dry

everything that came into contact with the water. "Clean it. Drain it. Dry it." And I would add, not just the boat, but carefully check the trailer, which can hook onto all sorts of plant life during the launch and retrieve process.

As for the Seneca Sail and Power Squadron, we have had a major change of officers and leadership, and we are finding our way in the process of running our Squadron. Most of our Executive Committee attended a workshop on Operations Training, ably presented by Past Commander Charles Fausold, which helped us to see how each of the offices, duties and responsibilities are linked and supportive of the other. We have plenty of activities planned for the summer between our social events and educational offerings, which I will not list here. We have a robust plan for continuing our Seneca Junior Sailing program and we are excited about another season helping young people learn the joy of sailing. Common Sense Rule - As I am writing this article April 26th, just heard this on CNN... April 25 - At least four people are reported missing after a severe storm capsized sailboats Saturday afternoon during a regatta in Mobile Bay, Alabama, Coast Guard

spokesman Carlos Vega said. Five people had been reported missing, but one of them has since been rescued, the Coast Guard said. More than 100 sailboats took part in the Dauphin Island Race and as many as 50 people in all were rescued from the water, the Coast Guard said.

The loss of life is a terrible tragedy and our hearts go out to these folks that are members of our greater community. This is a serious reminder that we MUST always check the weather reports before we head out and if there is a threat of severe weather we have to keep an eye on the sky for fast moving frontal systems. Almost every one of us has a smart phone, we should all have VHF marine radios, and these devices have up-to-the-minute weather being reported on them including radar and NOAA emergency warnings. Pay attention. Don't get caught unaware. Skippers, you are responsible for your boat and anyone on it. If you see things turning ugly, put that life vest on and have everyone of your crew do the same and get the boat as ready as you can. We can all enjoy boating if we use our heads. Always have a plan in mind if things get challenging.

Best wishes to our fleet this summer as we look forward to enjoying the 2015 boat season!!!!

As the snow banks slowly recede and we begin to think about Spring Commissioning of our boats it is an opportune time to assess safety equipment. The

District 6 Spring Council that I recently attended featured an excellent refresher course in first aid,

and among the topics I found especially useful was a listing of the suggested contents of an on-board first aid kit.

Suggested First Aid Kit Components

- Water proof case
- 2 absorbent compress dressings (5x9 inches)
- 25 adhesive bandages (assorted sizes)
- 2 adhesive cloth tape (10 yards x 1 inch)
- 5 antibiotic ointment packets (approx. 1 gram)
- 5 antiseptic wipe packets
- 2 packets of aspirin (81 mg each)

- 1 blanket (space blanket) (Available on Red Cross store)
- 1 breathing barrier (with one-way valve)
- 1 instant cold compress
- 4 pair of nonlatex gloves (size large)
- 2 hydrocortisone ointment packets (approx. 1 gram each)
- Scissors, shears (do not use for fishing!!!!)
- 1 roller bandage (3 inches wide)
- 1 roller bandage (4 inches wide5 sterile gauze pads (4x4 inches)
- Oral thermometer (non-mercury/nonglass)
- 2 triangular bandages
- Tweezers

 Over the counter medications (Tylenol, Dramamine, Benadryl)

Other possible items

Forceps

Warm pack compress

Eye drops

Quick Clot

Tourniquet

Distilled water

Automatic External Defibrillator

Portable Oxygen tank

Light source/ cyalume light stick

Here's a handy little tip I just read about in the April 2015 issue of Sail Magazine: Have a cut or wound and need to stop any bleeding? Use cayenne pepper. Apply it directly to the wound in powder form or mix it with some water to be applied as a paste and wrap with gauze, it should stop the bleeding in short time. The powder must be cayenne pepper only, not a mixture of spices.

This technique even works for pets that get cut too. It's cheap, easy to keep in stock, there's no burning, and even better – it's also great when used in cooking.


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Marine Electronics module. If you are interested in taking this class, please contact me so we can schedule it.

Seamanship

The Seamanship course is the next step after completing America's Boating Course (ABC), taking the knowledge and skills learned there and expanding and extending them with this newly updated edition. The course presents material applicable to both power and sail, covering such topics as the construction and functioning of a

Sail

Sail (Sa) is a complete sail course beginning with

basic boat designs, rigging and sail processes for the non-sailor. The course proceeds into the physical aspects of sailing, sail applications, marlinespike, helmsmanship, and handling of more difficult sailing conditions, navigation rules, and an introduction to heavy weather sailing.



The course is taught over a 9-week period with a mix of classroom and on-the-water sessions. Students are expected to take on an active role aboard the instructional vessels so that they can feel, first-hand, the effects of design parameters on the handling and performance of a boat.

In order to teach the course in the time available (boating season in upstate New York is WAY too short), the Seneca Sail & Power Squadron recommends that students have completed the Seamanship course prior to taking Sail. This allows instructors to skip over material also covered in the Seamanship class.

Youth Committee Report

After what has seemed like eternal ice age, the world has slowly but surely thawed out and all of us boaters are growing anxious, including the junior sailors. My sailing companions and I are more than excited to know that *Tomfoolery*'s launch date is less than three weeks away and that Junior Sailing activities are right around the corner.

During the ice age, much planning and preparations have taken place for 2015 Seneca Junior Sailing. Rolf Lewis has been busy designing exquisite posters with catchy slogans and striking images to attract attention to the program. These posters will be hung up in area high schools.

As many of you know, Tom Alley has worked hard to recruit more boats and coaches to potentially expand the program. Currently, there are three boats and five coaches enlisted. Tom is looking to possibly gather an additional boat or two to act as fill-ins when another boat is unavailable. The program will be open to 15 junior sailors this summer, who will be divided into three crews.

A proposed calendar has been organized for the program's activities this summer, similar to the pilot schedule followed last year. During June and July, we plan to have training sessions on Saturday mornings, to have sailors become familiar with the boats and the rules of road. After introducing racing tactics, the junior sailors will participate in the Finger Lake Yacht Club's Saturday races during August and September. Longer, cruise-style races, including the Commodore's Cup Race and the Seneca Barge Race in Geneva, will be invitational for experienced and skilled junior sailors.

The newly formed Youth Committee, composed of Rolf and I, aspire to arrange more social events for the junior sailors and their parents. The program will also encourage enrollment in USPS courses throughout the summer, especially the ABC class offered in August. Tom has also considered expanding the program to include seminars on topics including boat ownership and maintenance, particularly during the spring and fall.

Saturday, May 30th, is our orientation meeting date for interested and returning junior sailors and parents. Everyone will have a chance to hear about the program, meet the coaches, and tour the boats.

The due date for registration will be June 2nd, and the sailing adventures are set to begin June 6th!

Finally, I am beyond ecstatic to announce that *Tomfoolery*'s departure date for her voyage to Lake Ontario is less than 2 months away. *Tomfoolery*'s crew will be traveling with Mike Crouse and his crew on *Seek Ye First*. With both Tom and Mike being junior sailing coaches, several legs of the trip will be open for junior sailors to join as crew – including segments in the canal and on both Seneca Lake and Lake Ontario. The trip will provide opportunities for the crew to experience canals, locking, open-water sailing on a large lake, and practice with traditional navigation techniques. Can't wait for this adventure!

I'm sure glad the ice age is over. See you all at the marina very soon!

Vessel Safety Examination

United States Power Squadron, in cooperation with the US Coast Guard, has the ability to conduct Vessel Safety Examinations to ensure that watercraft meet the Coast Guard safety requirements.

Seneca Sail and Power Squadron currently has one certified Vessel Safety Examiner, Don Kloeber, whose is home port is Sampson. Vessel Safety Checks in the Watkins Glen area were typically performed by Peter Knott.

Currently, four members of he Seneca Sail and Power Squadron are working for their certification as Vessel Safety Examiners. Those members are Mark Erway, Charlie Fausold, Jim McGinnis and Ray Margeson. They have passed the written examination and after they perform five Vessel Safety Checks under the supervision of a currently certified Vessel Safety Examiner they will be able to perform Vessel Safety Checks.

These Vessel Safety Examinations are intended to ensure that watercraft comply with the Coast Guard safety standards. If the vessel passes the examination, a sticker is issued. If the vessel fails any required standard, there is no adverse action. The check is simply intended to further safe boating.

So, this summer is a good time to get your annual Vessel Safety Examination performed by one of your squadron shipmates.
