One of the reasons for this change in leadership is that, even though Tom Alley has very capably served as our SEO for nearly 14 years, he was feeling as if he had been "elected for life". So, this change allows him to take on a new challenge in serving at the District level, as ADEO (Assistant District Education Officer) with the intention of moving up to DEO, and who knows what after that. And, in case you haven't heard yet, in 2016 our Squadron sent a nomination to the District 6 Bridge to consider Tom Alley for the Chapman Award, a prestigious award which recognizes excellence in teaching. After serious scrutiny and deliberation, the District staff voted to recognize Tom's dedication to the task

of safe boating education and his superior abilities as an instructor, mentor and guide. At the Fall Conference in Binghamton, D/C William Herrick and DEO Ken Green presented Tom with The Chapman Award. The District then forwarded Tom's nomination paperwork to National, where it was reviewed and they decided to recognize Tom, this time, at the national level. Tom was contacted by V/C Craig D. Fraser, SN, National Educational Officer, to inform him that the award would be presented at the National Conference in Orlando on February 25th, 2017. Needless to say, this is quite an achievement and we are thrilled that Tom has been recognized with the National Chapman Award. Congratulations Tom!!!

Junior Sailing will be entering its fourth year with a season running June through October. With Katie Alley and Maggie MacBlane sharing the leadership, they are in a transitional year because of impending graduations and college on the horizon. They are looking forward to a busy race schedule with the Finger Lakes Yacht Club as well. From the Education Officer

Our United States Power Squadrons is founded on three fundamental principles: Service to the Community, Boater Education, and Fellowship. While these three are equally

important for our Squadron to be successful, my new role as SEO is to lead the Boater Education functions. I have been able to serve as the Assistant Squadron Education officer for the last several years and as an instructor before that to prepare me for this position.

That being said, we have in our midst the current Charles F. Chapman Award winner for Excellence in Teaching for the entire United States Power Squadrons, Tom Alley. For me, I am fortunate in my role to have Tom to help guide our program and provide the highest level in education available in USPS. For you, that means that, here in the Southern Tier, we have the opportunity to learn from the best and most capable instructors trained and supported by Tom.

Our opportunities for education include everything from the basics of America's Boating Course (ABC) which we offer to the public as a community service, all the way to Navigation (including Celestial Navigation which has been practiced by skippers since the beginnings of rec-

orded history). The breadth of our offerings are from Sail to Cruise Planning to elective classes in Weather, Electrical Systems and Engine Maintenance. In addition, there are 25 seminars that range from Anchoring and Partner in Command (for the First Mate) to GPS Navigation. Any of these can be taught for and by our squadron based on the skills of our strong and experienced instructor cadre.

We have organized the required classes into a six-year repeating schedule which would allow a Squadron Member to progress from novice crew to Senior Navigator taking two to three classes per year. We also encourage squadron members to consider becoming instructors themselves to pay back to the community as they have learned from others.

With the table below you can plot your course through the sequence of classes and achieve the level of proficiency you desire. The instructor team also will support self-study for an individual on any class at any time to advance progress on a specific topic.

For 2017, the Piloting course has just started February 22nd and will be followed by Seamanship starting in May. ABC will be offered during the active boating season and we are in the planning stages for the electives and seminars. Let me or Tom know what you are interested in.

Our Seneca Sail and Power Squadron is unique in our focus on “on the water” training activity offered. We have “on

the water” classes in the ABC class, Seamanship and Sail courses. These classes provide the opportunity for “hands on” practice with power and sail boats on boats shared with our students from our power squadron - so you don’t need your own boat to get started!

Our Seneca Sail and Power Squadron is also unique in our focus on “Junior Sailing” to bring in younger sailors and grow our community of boaters. This includes hands on sailing with coaches, racing with members of the Finger Lakes Yacht Club and longer weekend and multi week overnight trips from NY’s Finger Lakes to the Great Lakes.

71% of the earth is covered by water. Don’t miss out on some of the greatest experiences in life. Join us as a student –

become part of a class group and learn with others. If you don’t see the class you want, call me and we can put it together for a group or as a self-study.

A final note: The Commanders Challenge – Our Squadron Commander, Mark Erway, would like to challenge every Seneca Squadron member to take a USPS class each year. We have something for everyone in the spectrum of classes from the United States Power Squadrons. I am taking Junior Navigation. Set a goal for yourself and call me or Tom Alley to sign up for a class.

With Spring fast approaching, the Junior Sailing program already has nine coaches and six confirmed classroom boats. Training sessions will begin in June and last through July, and participation in club races will begin in August and last through end of the season. This year there is plenty of hype around our Lake Ontario Cruise, which will take place in July and include participation in the D6 Rendezvous in Kingston, Canada. The official dates will be released soon.

The Youth Committee will also be very busy planning the crafting of a cardboard boat to represent the Junior Sailing program in the notorious Cardboard Boat Regatta at the Waterfront Festival in June. Marine Refrigeration Seminar

Marine refrigeration is one of those subject that tends to be pushed to the side and treated like one of the black arts beyond the capability of mere mortals. This seminar will help clear up some of this mystery and give you a feel for how things work as you engage in hands-on activities to convert a sailboat's ice box to a full-fledged refrigerator.

Seamanship

Build boating confidence and competence for safe and fun on-the-water adventures. Seamanship provides a foundation of knowledge and skills in boat handling and maneuvering, boat operation, skipper's responsibilities, and boating techniques that will advance your boating enjoyment.

What's included?

For both sail and power boats, Seamanship covers a wide range of topics, including:

- Types of boats and how they behave on the water
- Anchoring in various conditions
- Docking and line handling
- Close quarter maneuvering
- Rules of the road
- Communication with other boats
- How to respond to various emergencies
- Marlinespike/basic knots
- And other interesting topics

This course is normally completed in 8 two-hour sessions: 3 sessions of class room study, 4 sessions “on the water” and one session for the exam. The “on-

the-water” classes are Friday evenings from 6:30PM to 8:30PM

We will begin the class in the early May timeframe and it will complete in late June. If you are interested in taking this class, please contact Jim McGinnis as soon as possible.

Vessel Safety Checks

A Vessel Safety Check (VSC) is performed at your boat – ranging in locations from boat to your driveway. A vessel safety check usually takes 15 to 30 minutes, depending upon the size of your boat. And your examination can take place on the hard or on a trailer as well as afloat – get a head start on the boating season

What's In it For Me?

Vessels passing safety checks are awarded a U.S. Coast Guard/Power Squadron Decal that informs:

- Coast Guard
- Harbor Patrol
- Sheriff's & Police
- other boating law-enforcement & safety agencies

that your boat was in full compliance with all Federal and State boating laws during a safety check for that year. Best of all every Vessel Safety Check is 100% Free of charge!

What if I Don't Pass?

If your boat does not pass, no citation is issued at that time. Instead, you are

provided a written report in how to correct any discrepancies.

Why Receive a Vessel Safety Check?

Safety! The peace of mind that your boat meets federal safety standards and that in an emergency you will have the necessary equipment to save lives and summon help.

In some cases, boating insurance agencies offer discounts for vessels which undergo a Vessel Safety Check every year. All decals and safety checks are void December 31st of year they are inspected, they are also void should the operator /owner fail to maintain the vessels equipment or the vessel itself to the standard at the time of the safety check.

Find an Examiner

Seneca Sail and Power Squadron has several certified Vessel Safety Examiners located from Seneca Harbor Marina to Lodi and spots in between. To get yours, just drop an e-mail to vsc@SenecaPowerSquadron.US.

New Seneca Web Site

The new Seneca Squadron web site went online at the end of last year. If you haven't checked it out, yet, you should do so.

One of the biggest changes to the new site is that everyone has an individual login. If you haven't logged in, yet, you should do so.

Your user name is your certificate number. Make sure you use capital letters, however, or it won't work.

Your password will default to “password” (all lower case). The first time you log in, you will be prompted to enter a new password.

If you have trouble logging in, you can click on the “Forgot your password” link and enter your e-mail address. (Make sure it's the same one that's on file with the USPS.) You'll be sent a note with a link to get you logged in within a few minutes.

If all else fails, send me an e-mail (webmaster@SenecaPowerSquadron.US) and we'll get it straightened out.

The second feature available to you on the web site is that you can sign up for events in the Squadron calendar. Plan on attending the next dinner meeting? Click on the event in the online calendar and then click on the “RSVP” button. If you’ve already logged in, your name and e-mail address will appear in the form and all you have to do is say how many people will be in your party. Click on the “submit” button and you’ll receive a confirmation e-mail of your registration in a few minutes. (If you don’t get the e-mail, then make sure you follow up by contacting the event organizer directly to ensure that we save a seat for you!)

Canal Cruising Nav Aid Suggestion

When traveling the New York and Canadian canal systems we have frequently found it is helpful to have a reminder regarding the direction of navigational aids – e.g. are we running with red to Port or to Starboard? This becomes especially important as the navigation aid colors reverse, sometimes at somewhat arbitrary points, and we are frequently changing helmsman for relief and for other chores along the way.

We have used an inexpensive home-made color coded device (*see photo*) at the helm as a reminder for the helmsman. We have made it a practice to maintain a duplicate device, at a second location, as a double check for the crew. When passing a navigation

aid reversal point it is announced and both parties reverse the colors to the new orientation. When making a change of crew at the helm, both aids are checked for agreement and the current orientation is discussed while both parties are at the helm.

Answer:

Three reversals will be encountered as follows...

RED TO PORT - Leaving Village Marina or Sampson SP Marina to & thru Cayuga / Seneca Canal to the north end of Cayuga Lake to Erie Canal Junction and Erie Canal east to Three Rivers.

Reversal #1 – At Three Rivers

RED TO STARBOARD - Oswego River - Three Rivers to Top of Lock O-8 in Oswego.

Reversal #2 – Bottom of Lock #8

RED TO PORT - Bottom Lock O-8 and leaving Oswego Harbor. Assume passing West of Main Duck Island to the marked shipping channel. Lake Ontario to St Lawrence River North

Channel to Kingston via the Lower Gap.

Reversal #3 – Leaving St Lawrence River N Channel

RED TO STARBOARD - Entering Kingston Harbor & Confederation Basin Marina.
