For our primary objectives in 2021, we look to our purpose as an organization. We want to commit to continuously improving our efforts in Boat Safety, Boating Education, Community Service and engaging our ABC-FLX members.

Membership Activity

We must work to reboot our level of social connection. We've been

socially distancing for a long time now and getting pretty dismayed by it. We will endeavor to increase our connections this year and join our boating friends when on land and on the water. The online Change of Watch and Boating Museum presentation was a good starting point.

Summer Weekend at Sampson Marina

This will be a super weekend at Sampson with socially safe group activities and cookouts. Last year we had a traditional *Welcome to Sampson Bloody Mary* with Don and Marge Kloeber on Saturday morning. Awesome way to start the day! We organized a GPS scavenger hunt that everyone enjoyed and built some electronic navigational skills at the same time. The weekend is tentatively planned for July 30th to August 1st and we will consider conducting some of the evaluations on the water for Boat Operator Certification. Please consider attending this event on your boat or by driving up to join us at Sampson.

Safety and Community Service

We will commission a second Life Jacket Tree this year, we have had one at the Clute Park Kayak Launch and will add another this year off Boat Launch road in the Clute Park Campground. These have been effective in providing life jackets to those in need and reminding boaters of the importance of wearing a life jacket.

We will also work to publicize National Safe Boating Week May 22nd-28th, 2021 and emphasize the critical "Life Jacket - Wear it Campaign". Consider that in two thirds of all boating accidents, victims have drowned. Of those victims. 90% were not wearing a life jacket of any kind. Of recorded incidents where an individual falls overboard or their boat capsizes, 44% lead to a fatality. Our goal is to change those odds and encourage the use of lifejackets for sailors, kayakers, sportsmen, fishermen, and all recreational boaters.

We will be conducting Vessel Safety Exams as soon as we can do it in the safe and effective manner.

Boating Education

We will be continuing to execute on our long-term course

plan and this year add several seminars that people have been asking for. We are currently conducting the Electronic Navigation Course. We will begin socially distanced America's Boating Club basic courses as soon as this spring.

If possible, we will be taking our first steps with Boat Operator Certification (BOC). What is BOC? – It's a program that USPS has had for many years that includes hands-on skills proficiency in boating. The BOC Program certifies USPS members at various levels of recreational boating proficiency. Each level of certification requires achievement of prior levels, the successful completion of particular skills and seminars, plus the demonstration of essential skills on the water. There are four levels in the program:

- Inland Navigator
- Coastal Navigator
- Advanced Coastal Navigator
- Offshore Navigator

The benefit of BOC to our members is in building confidence in boating skills with an eye towards venturing beyond Seneca Lake for our boating opportunities. If you are interested in participating, we are looking for our initial BOC candidates and also for members to eventually become trained BOC Certifiers. For more information contact me or Charlie Fausold.

Climate Friendly Living



United States was a good place to live considering what the experts were telling us about climate change. It's just an interesting question to ponder... where can you move to (within the US) that will see the least impacts from climate change? We know sea level will rise, we know temperatures will be warmer and the weather more severe... so where do you go to minimize those impacts on yourself, your family and your fortunes? I wasn't so much worried about my wife or me, but my children and grandchildren will inherit our estate and it would be foolish to leave them with assets that might be endangered by a changing climate.

If you are one of the few thinking individuals who do not yet embrace the science of climate change, you might as well stop reading and go back to your hole. The science is settled...the only thing that we're unsure of now is how fast and how far the climate will change and what impact our mitigation measures will have on the trajectory of change.

Depending on where you are in the US, scientists project sea level

rise (SLR) of between 1-3 meters by the end of this century, depending on global emission levels of greenhouse gases like carbon dioxide and methane. That's a significant rise that will have devastating consequences for many coastal communities across the US, so investing in that oceanfront condo may not be such a good idea – not because it will get washed away anytime soon, but as soon as the real estate market takes SLR seriously, I expect we'll see major changes in the valuation of coastal real estate, and it won't be pretty. So, I'll scratch coastal areas off my list of relocation possibilities.

Warmer temperatures are also expected, as we've seen already. Places like Florida, the gulf coast and the southwest are already too hot for me (at least in summer) so any increase in temperatures in these locations will certainly make matters worse. So, I'll cross the south off my list as well.

Then there's the issue of severe weather. How all those nice folks in Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma can live year after year under the threat of tornadoes is beyond me. And it's going to get worse as time goes by. The same goes for hurricanes along the south and east coasts and the different sort of severe weather like we're seeing in Texas these recent days. Nope, I don't look to relocating to the Midwest anytime soon, and coastal regions have already been eliminated.

The Pacific northwest holds some promise, but they have the threat of earthquakes out there, so I'll scratch off anywhere west of the continental divide on the grounds that earthquakes terrify me.

That leaves the Great Lakes area, which includes us here in

Schuyler County and the Finger lakes generally. We can expect all the same impacts here as well (except maybe SLR) but hopefully not to the degree or with the consequences noted above. There was a very good study released recently by the Environmental Law & Policy Center (ELPC www.ELPC.org) studying the impact climate change will have on the Great lakes. It's well written and informative and one of the few good analyses of expected climate impacts done on a relatively local scale. It can be found here:

and on ELPC's website and I urge readers to check it out, as the topic is far more complex than I've portrayed here.

One of the issues of importance to us as Finger Lakes boaters is lake levels. This is also a complicated topic, not only impacted by climate and precipitation, but by dams and flow control rules that seem to have many masters. I've

not found a lot of information about lake levels and climate change and even the ELPC study seems to waffle on expected impacts. My sense is that lake levels will be influenced more by precipitation changes than any other climate impact, and given the expected slight changes in annual precipitation patterns, it would seem likely that climate change itself will not dramatically affect lake levels any time soon. That's the good news.

The point in all this is that we seem to have moved to just the right spot!! Not to warm, not too cold, not too stormy, not too wet or dry. A good placed to invest in and to ride out the climate wave that is coming to this and future generations.

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Getting the Word Out



changes.

As our new normalcy sets in, the challenge of getting out the word about our public activities, large and small, is going to be even greater than it was before the pandemic. Inviting our communities to our events also is going to be more important than ever.

It's no secret that some traditional paths for publicity – daily newspapers – have been narrowed, if not completely blocked. But many others, both traditional and digital, are eager to publish community items and are well-used by the public.

The first step to successful publicity is obvious: Someone has to write the news release or design the flyer. Don't forget the five W's: Who, What, When, Where and Why. Have a second person, or more, review the work before it's distributed. Some tips:

- Distribute releases and flyers via email at least two weeks ahead, if the subject is an event.
- The news release can be in the body of the email or an attachment. If an attachment, use a common format such as Microsoft Word. Do not issue a news release as a PDF or jpeg. They're not easy for an editor or reporter to work with, and we want the process to be as easy as possible.
- The primary submission should always be a news release. A flyer can be an addon, especially for use online.
- Include a photograph as an email attachment if appropriate. If there are people in the photograph, identify them.
- Always put contact information somewhere in the news release and flyer and make sure all online links are active before sending them out to the public.

Look around your community for places to submit news releases and flyers. Free newspapers, known by some as "shoppers." Community newspheets. Weekly newspapers. Daily newspapers. Monthly community or regional magazines. Chamber of Commerce calendars. Television and radio stations. Community news websites and Facebook pages.

Some may charge a fee. Most do not. They're grateful to have the news item.

Facebook has become a powerful tool for spreading information. Look at how our county Public Health departments have used it during the pandemic.

Many folks have started community Facebook pages. The name might be "yard sale," but most also post event flyers. "Memories of" Facebook pages also are good sites.

Flyers by non-profit organizations can be posted in most post offices. Many convenient stores also have places for flyers.

Lastly, releases and flyers should be shared by email with the organization's members. Encourage them to then forward to their own email lists and post to their own Facebook pages.

Offshore Navigation

(Formerly Junior Navigation)

Offered by the Rochester Chapter Thursdays, March 18th – June 17th

What happens when your GPS fails? Be prepared, have fun, and satisfy your curiosity about boating in the days before electronics in the Junior Navigation course.

Learn to use a marine sextant to take sights on celestial objects such as the sun. Even if you are not traveling long distances offshore, remember that GPS is not infallible, nor always available. Be confident when no aids to navigation or land objects are in sight.

In Offshore Navigation, you will continue to use GPS as the primary position sensor as you learned in Marine Navigation and Advanced Marine Navigation, but with celestial navigation as your backup technique. Because terrestrial landmarks are no longer visible to the offshore navigator, you will learn to use a marine sextant and the sun as your reference point, derive a line of position and develop a running fix. You will also learn to calculate your latitude from a noon sight on the sun.

What's included?

• Determining precise time Finger Lakes Chapter

- Using the Nautical Almanac
- Determining latitude from a noon sight
- Using special charts and plotting sheets for offshore navigation
- Setting offshore navigational routines for recreational craft

This interesting and challenging course emphasizes the practical aspects of daytime celestial navigation. You will also learn to prepare a sight folder that documents your positioning skills using sights taken on the sun. The course will take approximately 14 weeks and you will have two additional weeks to complete an open book exam. Detailed instructions about joining the class through Google Meet will be supplied to interested students.



Boat Handling Course

May 6 – June 12

Our new *Boat Handling* course is intended for newer recreational boaters who have completed a

Boat Handling covers these topics:

- Rules of the Road: A Practical Approach
- Confidence in Docking and Undocking: Slow-Speed Maneuvering
- Boating with Confidence: Handling Your Boat Under Way
- Anchoring with Assurance: Don't Get Carried Away
- Emergencies on Board: Preparation for Handling Common Problems
- Knots and Line Handling: The Knots You Need to Know

This course will be held Thursday evenings, 7 to 9pm in the Schuyler County Human Services Complex, 323 Owego St. in Montour Falls. There will be 6 classroom sessions beginning May 6th, and a final review session on the water on Saturday, June 12th at 9:00am, followed immediately by the exam. Classroom sessions will also be offered over *FreeConferenceCall* for those unable to attend in person. Completion of all six classes and achieving a passing grade on the exam will earn the "Seaman" grade, the first of five America's Boating Club advanced grades.

The cost of the full course for ABC-FLX members is \$70 (\$22 for each additional family member sharing the course materials) and includes a downloadable student book as well as the downloadable US Coast Guard *Navigation Rules and Regulations Handbook.* There is an additional charge if you want printed versions of the student manual (\$10) and USCG handbook (\$12.50).

Each topic is also available as a free-standing seminar. If taken individually, each seminar is \$13 (electronic downloaded materials) or \$16 (printed materials). You will get credit for taking the seminars, but again, need to take all six and pass the exam to receive credit for the Boat Handling course.

Boaters need to speak up now to prevent this proposal from moving forward and ask the Governor Andrew Cuomo to engage in an open, transparent process to ensure the future of this historic waterway, not only for the recreational boaters in New York and beyond, but for the communities along its length.

Send a message to your state legislators asking they remove the Governor's 30-day budget amendment TED Bill Part VV, also known as the "*New York State Canal System Revitalization act*," which was introduced in the budget process at the last minute with no opportunity for public input.
